VERITAS, CARITAS, ET RISUS

Why does February have 28 days? It is an old story.

Our calendar is based on the Roman system, in which originally there were 10 months in the year. It was derived from the lunar year, which consists of 355 days. Eventually, two more months were added, January and February. That time period was previously considered "monthless" and was just free-floating days. The Romans thought even numbers were unlucky, so the months had either 29 or 31 days to avoid, mostly, that problem. However, there would always need to be an even numbered month and so February was given that dishonor. Why? Because it was the month dedicated to both purification and honoring the dead. Bad luck abounds.

Of course, we do not have that same problem with even numbers, as the modern months with 30 days would suggest. And there are now 365 days in a year, 365.2425 to be accurate. This is a solar year calendar rather than one linked to the cycles of the moon. We add one day every four years resulting in a leap year with 29 days in February. This is a messy system.

But it is a mess by necessity. With fractional days under the solar calendar, there can never be perfectly apportioned months. It is also messy if you follow the moon, because over time the sun-linked seasons would shift across the months. And the actual length of the lunar year is 354.367 days because the Romans rounded up to avoid an even number.

Why do we care about months at all? We need to know when it will be hot or cold, rainy or dry, given where we live in the world. Historically that was important because human beings lived off the land, farming and raising livestock. You needed to know when to plant, when to move the flocks, when to harvest, and when to start all over again. We still feel the need to know what to expect and that need can tell us much about how we as human beings navigate our lives.

February marks the beginning of the season of Lent. It is the lead up to Easter, symbolizing the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert being tempted by Satan. Notice that it begins in February, the Roman time of purification. We can only guess when Jesus might have gone out into the wilderness, but the Lenten tradition overlaps with the Roman practice. Much like the messy months of the year, there has not been a burning need to place aside past reliance on pre-Christian elements like this. The traditions are maintained because they are traditions, not because they derive from currently predominant religious or cultural influences.

Is that inertia at work? Perhaps. But it is also maintaining a connection to the past and across the generations. Sometimes it might be good to work from a clean slate. But usually not. It is hard to know where you are going if you have forgotten, or rejected, where you have been. A thought for the coming Easter season.


