# VERITAS, CARITAS, ET RISUS

On April 22, 1970, Earth Day was first observed. The day is intended to honor the Earth and to celebrate possibilities for peace in the world. It began as an exercise of environmental activism in the United States, originally under the name "Environmental Teach-in" – it was the 1970s. That clunky name gave way to "Earth Day" after a Madison Avenue advertising executive named Julien Koenig offered his services, recasting the day in more celebratory ways.

One might imagine this as a generational throwback, a Hippie era practice with nice intentions but little real-world impact. Five decades later, we are faced with far greater environmental challenges than 1970s activists could have imagined. Which leads to a question: should a church community be concerned with the environment?

"Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." (Gen. 1:28). This line from Genesis has been taken to mean that human beings have the right to use the world as they see fit, along with any creatures they find within it. And yet that is an assumption based upon one line from the Bible. Here is another: "To the Lord your God belong the heavens, even the highest heavens, the earth and everything in it." (Deut. 10:14). In the scriptures, the world is offered as a gift and as a trust, to be used and to be protected. That use is conditioned on taking good care of what has been offered and passing that trust along to future generations.

The word "sustainable" is often used to describe how human beings should act. And to be sustainable, whatever activity is in question should be possible now and in the future, without the prospect of that opportunity being denied to our children or grandchildren. If one generation uses up a resource or destroys a landscape, that means the later generations are being deprived of their right to share in creation, even as creation is diminished or despoiled.

This is often a question of "somewhere else." If the harm falls somewhere else, it is not seen as a problem. If forests are destroyed in Brazil or Indonesia, it is not our problem. Ignoring the selfish nature of such a view, it is also mistaken. Without large forests to absorb carbon from the air, the atmosphere heats up. Weather patterns become increasingly erratic and dangerous. Droughts become more severe even as dangerous flooding eventually tears away at the bone-dry land. California has become a microcosm of these worries. In far off New England, with warming winters, we may not seem to be first in line for problems. But we will not be able to avoid them forever, even as friends and family in the West and South struggle with floods, fires, and storms.

Earth Day is an occasion to remember that we have one home. It is a home that we share with many others and across time. If you have ever had a thought like, "There but for the grace of God go I..." when looking at a news report from across the nation, or from around the world, that sense of grace is also an opportunity to remember that God has given much to the people of the world and we are therefore called to care for that legacy. Grace suggests a gift and the gift of the world is ours for the moment, held in trust for those who will come after. In other words, this is indeed the concern of the church and for people who might call themselves followers of Jesus.


