VERITAS, CARITAS, ET RISUS

I was looking around for a topic for this month's bulletin and I noticed that I had never looked at the origin of the term "April." Usually, my April missive is about Easter or Lent or something else from the season leading up to the holiday. April itself is not generally the subject.

April, or *Aprilis*, seems to come from the Latin verb *aperire*, meaning "to open." Like the flowers of the season, April is an opening up of the year from the relative quiet of the winter, or at least the "winter" as experienced on the Italian peninsula. We might style this as the "Month of Opening" or the "Time of Blooming," however the poetic influence takes us.

The names of the month used on the American calendar are carried over from the Roman Empire, even the weird artifacts of Julius Caesar making a month out of his name (July) and, not to be outdone, Augustus Caesar following suit (August). This led to the strange sequencing of September, the "seventh month," becoming the ninth and so forth for October and November.

There was a story a year or so ago about how often American men think about the Roman Empire, which for many was about once per day. That seems a lot, unless you are in my line of work. But the influence of Rome is pervasive. It is seeded into our everyday language even as it is inscribed across our calendars. And just as the written word is filled with Latin, so too are our ideas about the world.

The "nuclear family" as we understand it is squarely Roman. Contemporaries of Rome, like Greece or Judea, often had polygamous marriages. The Bible is filled with references to those, though we seem to have left those behind (no, I am not advocating for a revival by any means). The Romans were unusual in this regard. One theory is that their staunch monogamy arose from the relative egalitarianism between the genders in Roman society—big emphasis of the "relative." Early Christians adopted this model of marriage even as Romans would in time adopt (or co-opt) Christianity.

When we think about the traditions in our society, or in our religious institutions, it is worth remembering that some of these traditions were choices made at that distant point in history. The reasons for the choices are worth remembering and they are worth assessing as we evolve as a society of people making new choices for new times. We do not need to rename the months to ponder what is relevant and meaningful for our current world and way of life.

ALTAR FLOWERS




