VERITAS, CARITAS, ET RISUS

Ash Wednesday is March 5. We have not traditionally marked this day on our church calendar, though to do so would be consistent with our Anglican heritage. It marks the beginning of Lent, a solemn time that commemorates the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert and enduring temptation.

On Ash Wednesday, one can go to a church and receive ashes. Those ashes are a reminder of the beginning of Lent and the onset of various observances leading up to Easter. The ashes are generally made by burning palm fronds from the prior Palm Sunday and mixing the remains with holy water and oil as a fixative. They are applied in the form of a cross upon the forehead. The one offering the ashes says, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Not the cheeriest of messages, but a reminder of our mortality during a period of spiritual reflection.

On that day, people will often fast generally or refrain specifically from eating meat. This practice might also continue through the Lenten period, often limited to Fridays though some traditions see people refraining from certain foods the whole 40 days. My family would always follow the Friday "meatless" tradition, which is arguably less of a sacrifice in modern times and especially so in my hometown on the ocean. Another Lenten practice is to give something up until Easter. It might be some vice, like gambling, or a favorite food, like candy or desserts. This is another form of fasting and it made Easter morning chocolates even more enticing.

The purpose of such fasting varies by tradition. Sometimes it is a form of penance for sins that have been committed or as an acknowledgement to God of one's sinful nature. If your concept of sin does not include such a way of thinking, or exist at all, fasting can be a reminder of what Jesus went through so long ago. Fasting can also be a way of reorienting oneself by removing one or more distractions or taking on a specific discipline for a set period. Lenten observations can be as simple as giving something up for 40 days or they can be more aspirational.

You might even give up worrying for that period of time. You could abstain from doomscrolling through the news and wringing your hands at every troubling story. Some people equate "staying informed" with civic virtue, but in a time when spectacles and scandals are manufactured to stoke anxiety, the disciplined choice may now be to refrain. Just as children have rationed screen time, it might be an opportune moment to borrow such parenting wisdom for adult mental wellbeing.


